Introduction

YPAR (Young People at Risk) is an interagency initiative in the North Inner City that works to support, facilitate and implement an integrated approach to meeting the needs of young people at risk. YPAR defines a young person at risk as a child/young person aged 0 to 18 years experiencing significant personal, family, educational or social problems. Numerous government reports and policy documents over the last few years have identified interagency working as a crucial element in improving the quality of services delivered to young people at risk. YPAR provides a model of how this policy commitment can be delivered at a local level in Dublin North Inner City. YPAR network and staff have been working with the staff of the HSE and other agencies over the past year to develop a local integrated structure drawing on the experience of YPAR to support the implementation of a Local Area Pathway (LAP) which will be the statutory delivery mechanism for welfare support to children and families under the Children and Family Services Delivery Framework (CFSDF) to be delivered by the new Children and Family Support Agency in 2013.

Social and Economic background

Social and Economic background

Statistics from the 2012 Pobal Deprivation Index for Small Areas which was developed by Trutz Haase and Jonathan Pratschke from the 2011 Census of Population show that overall there has been a huge increase in disadvantage in wake of the recession since the 2006 Census, affecting literally every part of the country. This is no less the case in Dublin North Inner City where the 'rising tide' of the 'Celtic Tiger' failed to lift all boats. Persistent poverty remained for many families in the North Inner City throughout this period and is now compounded by recession. The general statistics to emerge from the analysis of Hasse and Pratschke (2012) are outlined below and cover the following North Inner City Electoral Districts;

Dublin North Inner City General Social and Economic Statistics

- 1. The population of the North Inner City area has increased by nearly 11% from 66,950 in 2006 to 74,452 in 2011.
- 2. There is an average of 20% age dependency across the area.

- 3. On average 42% of the households are headed by lone parents and in some districts this is as high as 63%.
- 4. The percentage of people with primary education only remains high at 18% on average across the electoral districts.
- There has been a huge increase in male unemployment to a massive 27% in 2011 from 15% in 2006. This has again marginally increased in 2012
- 6. Likewise female unemployment has increased from 12% on average across the districts of the North Inner City to 17% in 2011.
- 7. The numbers of families living in local authority housing averages 15% across the area.

Coupled with these statistics showing the high disadvantage of the North Inner City, like many other disadvantaged communities they are also experiencing increasing cuts and reductions to social and community services including;

- Youth Services cut by up to 14%
- Health Services, on-going reduction in health services through retrenchment of workers and reduction in budgets.
- Closing of some HSE community residential services
- RAPID programme, 50% cut in cost of employing RAPID Coordinator.
- Local and Community Development Programme between 9-12% cut in overall budgets
- Community Drug Services between 2-5% cut in services.
- Changes in CE including reduction in training budget and changes to payments affecting lone parents making it difficult to recruit eligible participants resulting in the reduction in some children and youth services such as Childcare, After School and Training programmes.
- Social Protection Payments reduced including Child Benefit, Children Back to School Allowance, changes in Medical Cards and prescription payments.
- Increase in household municipal property taxes and waste charges.

The deepening crisis of the recession accompanied with large scale cuts to public and community services affecting welfare dependent families highlights the challenges for families, communities and services providers in endeavouring to deliver on YPAR's vision of creating a place of Hope, where young people's dreams are realised. Indeed this makes it difficult for the Government to achieve its own vision for a Quality Irish Childhood as set out in the 2012 Report of the Task Force on the Child and Family Support Agency to ensure that Irish Children are:

• Healthy, physically, mentally and emotionally

- Supported in active learning
- Safe from accidental and intentional harm/ secure in the immediate and wider physical environment
- Economically secure
- Part of positive networks of family, friends, neighbours, and the community; are included and participating in society.

It is generally accepted that poverty and high deprivation are social determinants and contributing factors to poor health, family breakdown and risk factors that threatened welfare, wellbeing and mental health of children. However, Dublin's North Inner City is a community with a long history of rising to the challenge of tackling social and economic disadvantage and also with a strong history of community led collaborative and integrated responses to disadvantage. The community response has been based on strong local leadership and visionary leadership within its statutory and voluntary partners. The resulting mix and blend of community, voluntary and statutory provision has provided an extraordinary level of knowledge, expertise, creativity and experience, enabling YPAR to grow and strengthen to produce better outcomes for children at risk and their families.

YPAR, which advocates for multiagency planning is managed by an interagency Steering Committee made up of representatives from the following statutory, voluntary and community sectors:

HSE, Dublin City Council, an Garda Siochana, Probation Service, CDYSB, National Education Welfare Board, Irish Youth Foundation, Neighbourhood Youth Project 1, Neighbourhood Youth Project 2, Community After Schools Project (CASPr), Wexford Centre, Inner City Renewal Group, Inner City Organisations Network, North West Inner City Network, Ozanam House Resource Centre (SVP), Lourdes Youth and Community Services, Hill St. Family Resources Centre and Youth Representatives.

YPAR will endeavour to provide support and leadership in the drive towards improving the lives of young people at risk in Dublin North Inner City.

YPAR Vision

For the North Inner City to be a place of Hope, where young people's dreams are realised

YPAR Mission

To promote and develop a principled and integrated approach to working with young people that serves their needs and realises their dreams

YPAR Strategic Goals:

1. To implement the YPAR Protocol in the North Inner City.

- 2. To support and develop young people's participation in YPAR.
- 3. To inform service delivery and shape policy development.
- 4. To ensure that structures and organisation operate in an efficient manner.

YPAR Funding

The HSE, Probation Services, City of Dublin Youth Services Board, the North West Inner City Area Network and the Employment Network provided funding to YPAR in 2013 to support its work through a full time Administrator, a part time YPAR Coordinator and part time YPAR Protocol Coordinator.

YPAR Protocol

The YPAR Protocol is the key interagency mechanism in which YPAR supports specific problems for children's welfare within families. At present YPAR operates 40 Protocol cases involving over 60 children and young people. The YPAR Protocol is pivotal to the success of the YPAR initiative. The issues addressed for the young people and their families through the protocol include school attendance, lack of supervision, recreational needs, antisocial behaviour, criminal behaviour, mental health concerns (both for parents and children), physical health, accommodation, parental addiction and domestic violence. The benefits of the YPAR protocol include:

- The young person and their families are at the centre of service responses; it provides a confidential, safe and trusting environment for the young people and their families to address their needs
- The Protocol provides a useful and important mechanism to support the many service needs and supports to children and young people at risk
- It empowers the young people and their families by allowing them to take responsibility together, as part of the Protocol group, to improve their situations.
- It benefits front-line workers and their agencies by facilitating greater collaboration and knowledge between agencies and increases their understanding of the total needs of the young person thereby enabling a more coordinated and focused response to those needs.

YPAR operates through an age specific structure in which a number of interagency working groups meet to plan joint actions, share knowledge & experiences and provide mutual support as peers working in difficult and rewarding situations. The working groups include;

- The YPAR Steering committee
- The YPAR Protocol Steering Committee
- The Foreign Nation al Young People at Risk Working Group

- The 5-12 Working Group
- The 0-5 Working Group

Other YPAR Activities

Informing Policy and Practice

Throughout 2012 YPAR has met with key policymakers and agencies to discuss how interagency working can be facilitated and supported both at a practical and a policy level. The YPAR protocol is now used by over 90% of statutory, voluntary and community children and family services providers in the North Inner City. Also in 2012 and in response to a request from local children service organisations in the North West Inner City, YPAR agreed to expand the geographic remit of the Protocol to include the Dublin 7 area of the North inner city.

As part of YPAR's advocacy and lobbying activities YPAR participated in the following:

- Meeting with the Minister for Children at the FNYPAR Conference in January 2012
- Submission to the Department of Children's public consultation on Improving the lives of children and young people
- Meeting with the Officials at the Office for the Promotion of Migrant Integration
- Meeting with the Principal Officer for Social Inclusion at the Department of Education
- Participating in the development of the local Children and Family Services Delivery Framework
- Organising an interagency meeting in response to the crisis of families living in O Devaney gardens
- On-going meetings and collaboration with statutory services providers.
- Producing information, policy and monitoring reports to YPAR partners and funders.

Youth Involvement in YPAR

YPAR is currently working with local young people on a number of initiatives including;

- L-O.C.A.L (Looking-On. Community. Aspiration. Leadership) YPAR is providing ongoing support and helped in their one day community event in September (Inner City's Got Talent)
- Two young people have been identified and agreed to sit on the YPAR Steering Committee.
- Two young people represented YPAR at a social entrepreneur transnational event in Berlin in October.
- On-going support and development to the North Inner City Youth Bank
- YPAR organised a Conference for policy makers to identify and highlight issues for Foreign National Young People. The Conference was attended by over 60 FN young

people who proactively help identify strengthens, weaknesses and deficiencies in current services and policy.

- Supported through the FNYPAR working group a Consultation Residential for FN young people in the Cavan Centre
- Encouraging young people's participation in the various YPAR Working Groups

YPAR Strengthening Families

Following on from the successful delivery of the YPAR Strengthening Families Programme in the North Inner City in 2010 YPAR delivered the programme again in early 2012 with funding from the Community Foundation of Ireland and Croke Park Community Fund. The second YPAR SFP worked very effectively as an interagency initiative which benefited the 6 families who completed the programme. There were 9 different agencies providing facilitators and 7 referral agencies. An evaluation of the programme was carried out with the facilitators and families and a number of weaknesses were identified in the delivery of the programme. However, it was agreed by both the families and agencies involved with a number of changes the programmes should be delivered again in 2013.

North Wall Education and Welfare Group

YPAR continues to support and participate in the NWESG in enhancing interagency work in the North Wall Area. In 2012 Deirdre McCarthy, Community Technical Aid, undertook a research programme, consulting young people, community members and workers as part of the Needs Analysis, the report from which will be launched in February/March 2013. As well as the research the NWESG has met monthly shared information and ideas and developed common responses to some of the issues in the community. It has involvement from schools, youth workers, family support workers, community police forum and early learning support services.

Monitoring and Evaluation of YPAR Activities

As part of YPAR's person centred and learner centred approach to capturing the positive or negative outcomes of its approach, YPAR is developing ways to involve young people and their families who are engaging in the YPAR Protocol to feedback their views and critical analysis of the strengths and weakness of the Protocol and the YPAR interagency model.

The aim of YPAR is to improve the outcomes for young people at risk. Therefore it is essential to collect the evidence that shows whether or not our work is actually bringing about improved outcomes for the young people. YPAR set up a monitoring sub-group during the past year to help support it's monitoring and evaluation process and help draw on local knowledge and skills for capturing the outcomes of children services. While most workers recognise the merits of recording the outcomes from their work there have been difficulties in moving to a culture where workers will systematically and consistently record these as a normative part of their work. The YPAR Co-ordinator and Protocol Co-ordinator will continue to implement this monitoring and evaluation framework which it is hope will allow YPAR to capture both the learning and outcomes from the YPAR interagency process and activities and enable it to share this learning to inform policy and practice.

Challenges for YPAR

YPAR will continue to develop and support effective services to young people at risk in the North Inner City working in collaboration and cooperation with its community, voluntary and statutory partners as well as the young people and their families. YPAR will continue to engage with the National Children and Family Services Delivery Framework in the hope that this will produce better outcomes for young people and their families. However in doing so it is necessary to highlight some of the challenges and barriers that may affect the work of YPAR including;

- Uncertainty and confusion in relation to the effective rollout of the delivery of children welfare services under the National Children and Family Services Deliver Framework.
- The limited capacity of the YPAR staff to respond to the demands of the local Children and Family Services Deliver Framework with present quota of staff hours.....
- The recession and continued retrenchment of public services and funding cuts to complementary community services.
- Reluctance of some agency staff to take the lead on Protocol cases due to lack of support by managers.
- Persuading local workers of the merits of monitoring and recording the outcomes from their engagement in interagency work and in particular getting the views of young people and their families as a means to measure and assess the impact of this work.
- Lack of awareness or understanding of the operations of the Protocol by some agencies and workers.
- Uncertainty of future funding for YPAR.

Conclusion

YPAR continues to consolidate its core work and even develop new initiatives by drawing on the generous and collaborative interagency support of statutory key workers and local community project staff. In 2012 the interagency protocol continues to bring together service providers, services users and community support organisations to develop a safe and confidential way of interagency working that enables multi-agency supports to address the service needs of vulnerable children and young people. YPAR staff and partner workers have been proactively involved in supporting the development of a local mechanism for the delivery of the new Children and Family Services Delivery Framework and will continue this work in 2013.

Other interagency initiatives such as the Strengthening Families Programmes have also enabled YPAR to bring together agencies to develop tailored supports to families experiencing particular difficulties. This work will also continue in 2013 and new initiatives will be explored to support families and parenting.

YPAR has also worked at a number of levels to support and develop youth and family participation through local neighbourhood and community youth projects, engaging with the schools and pre-schools and seeking the active involvement of youth people in YPAR structures and activities. YPAR continues to recognise the additional problems facing local Foreign National People at Risk and will continue to provide supports and responses to their particular needs. The north inner city Youth Bank continues to be a valuable resource to support local youth initiatives and enable youth creative expression. Through its monitoring processes YPAR will continue to make links and share its learning with local, regional, national and international partners.

While the YPAR network and its partners are operating in very difficult economic times of increasing poverty and reductions in community services and supports, through its leadership and its local statutory, voluntary and community partners YPAR's vision, belief, commitment and collective talents will continue to advocate and demonstrate the value of cooperation, collaboration and the pooling and sharing of resources at local level and will continue to improve services and improved quality of life outcomes to young people at risk in the North Inner City of Dublin.
